From these years emerged the works which he later considered as the beginning of his career, pre-eminently the partial bodies of Three Studies for Figures at the Base of a Crucifixion, 1944 (Tate Gallery N06171) which was first shown at the Lefevre Gallery (April 1945) to unease and acclaim alike. Bacon became central to an artistic milieu in post-war Soho, which included Lucian Freud, Michael Andrews, the photographer John Deakin, Henrietta Moraes, Isabel Rawsthorne and others.

This period was an important transitional phase for Bacon. It was announced by a series of highly coloured and loosely handled paintings of van Gogh made in 1957 and was concluded by his Tate Gallery retrospective in 1962, the exhibition which confirmed his international reputation.

Second Version of Triptych 1944, 1988 is - as the title explains - a reworking of the earlier triptych Three Studies for Figures at the Base of a Crucifixion, 1943-4 (Tate Gallery N06171). Bacon frequently used his own works as starting points for new compositions, but the creation of second versions was a distinct practice for which the image and, by implication, its interpretation were accepted as having been established.

Crucifixion (CR 33-01) is an early oil on canvas painting by Francis Bacon, made in 1933 when the artist was aged 23-24.It was one of three paintings on the subject of the Crucifixion that he made in 1933, the others being his Crucifixion with Skull (CR 33-03), commissioned by the art collector Sir Michael Sadler, and Wound for a Crucifixion (later destroyed by Bacon).

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
